














Unum Volunteer Service Grant Program





After graduation she began teaching in Portland where she remained for 37 years. Her beginning years at Longfellow School and then 10 years at Lyman Moore Junior High were followed by 20 years at Portland High School, where she was advisor to the National Honor Society and co-drama coach, and where she received the honor of yearbook dedication and two outstanding teacher awards.

In 2006, she was inducted into the Portland Players Hall of Fame. Another theatrical highlight for Margaretmary was when she was cast as Alvira in "The Country of the Pointed Firs" opposite Julie Harris at WGBH Boston. She and Julie developed a lovely friendship, and corresponded for many years.

Childhood summers were spent at the family cottage in Old Orchard Beach, and in 1969, with her sisters Elizabeth, Catherine and Dorothy, she opened a tea room/gift shop in Pine Point called "The Periwinkle." For over 30 years "The McCann Girls" made delicious homemade desserts, but more importantly, they made countless friends from all over the U.S. and Canada.

In addition to teaching, her summer business and theater work, she also became well-known as a consultant in business-writing and communication. She worked for several companies among which were L.L.Bean, UNUM, Hannaford, Cole Haan and others. She also did some consulting on business texts for Houghton Mifflin Publishers.

After many years at their home on Hersey Street, in later years, Margaretmary and her sister Dottie moved to Applegate in Falmouth and in 2007 they moved to the Atrium at The Cedars. For too short a time, they enjoyed being Atrium neighbors with their dear brother, Carl! At The Atrium, Margaretmary made wonderful friends and entertained the residents with inspiring literary presentations on her favorite authors and often led spirited book discussions. Blessed with many friends and associates, Margaretmary was a member of the College Club, Women's Literary Union, Advisory Board of Portland Stage and Portland Players, Applegate Board of Directors, the Sandpiper Book Club, several bridge groups, the Outto-Lunch Bunch, the Breakfast Club and the Ladies who Lunch. A Story About Tea

For those few of us who like our martinis stirred not shaken, and hate coffee, there is a cup of hot tea. Tea is made from the fermented leaves of the *Camellia Senensis* bush. There are many varieties of tea but they all originate with the same plant - the Camellia. What distinguishes them are the soils they grow in, in the elevation and the process of fermentation they go through. The leaf when small, young and tender creates a finer tea drink. Older full-size leaves produce most of the commercial tea you buy in the grocery store. And the reason the tea in tea bags infuses your hot water so quickly is - it is tea dust. What is left over from the leaf processing, or

Here are some terms you will read:

just ground up for tea bags.

- o White tea White tea is the rarest, most delicate and most expensive tea. It is plucked by hand when the first leaf bud appears and before the leaf unfolds. That is a two day window. The leaf is about the size of the nail on your little finger. It is mostly harvested in the Fujian Provence of China. It costs about \$10 an ounce.
- O Green tea Green tea uses less fermentation and therefore the leaf is still green when processed. The beverage is light, pale green. The leaves are dried in sunlight, and then heated in large pans to stop the fermentation process early. The leaves are then continuously rolled into balls and then re-heated for several hours to remove any remaining moisture.
- Oolong tea Oolong is semi-fermented (mid-way from green to black) and mostly processed in China and Taiwan (Formosa). After initial drying in sunlight the leaves are shaken in large bamboo baskets to bruise the leaves which hastens the fermentation process. After the leaf turns slightly reddish the leaves are heated to stop the fermentation process.
- Black tea Black tea is like the other two but the bruising of the tea leaves is allowed to go on longer and the fermentation process more complete before the leaves are heated and the process stopped.
 Black tea is the most popular and almost all tea bags contain black tea.
- o *Pu-erh* (*Organic Pu-erh*) simple means the tea leaves are piled up in a basket and allowed to ferment without an intervention until they are black. It adds a certain earthy flavor to the leaves.

The tea leaves currently in my cupboard are all black because that's what I drink. They are:

• Organic Pu-erh, a leaf from Yunan Provence, China. Dark and complex beverage.

- **Darjeeling** -Superb 6000 grown in the Muscated Valley section of the Goomtee Estate in the Himalayas near Darjeeling, India. The leaves are the first tender shoots of young plants. Lighter gold color with floral bouquet.
- **Formosa Oolong** is called the "Champaign of Teas". It is only picked once a year when the flavor is highest. Some describe the flavor as a hint of ripe peaches. A mild reddish color beverage and very relaxing to drink.
- **Pochong Oolong** Sweet Jade Dew. The process is slightly different in that it is hand rolled multiple times to continue the fermentation process. It has a slightly sweet flavor with lilac notes. This is also a Formosa grown tea from high in the mountains.
- **Assam** is the Indian tea used in almost all commercial blends. It is strong, dark color and has a full flavor. I buy pure Assam rather than a blend for those mornings I want a cup with authority.

There are several tea importers on the east coast and west coast but the one I have used for the past 20 years is Grace Tea Company. Google them. If \$15 for an 8 ounce bag of tea seems expensive, a cup of tea works out to less than 10 cents.

John's comment in his email to me was "I guess it falls in the category of things we do after retirement. I still write. Research and write."
